Equinox Collaborates to Improve Access to Care, Reduce Avoidable Hospitalizations

As the national debate over health care reform rages on, Equinox is helping to improve access to high-quality, cost-effective care for low-income adults with chronic illnesses through its partnership in a Health Home.

Called Capital Region Health Connections, the Health Home is a network of 10 health and community agencies – each with its own area of expertise – that are working together to help more than 2,200 people get the care they need. Health Homes are part of an extensive plan in New York to restructure the health care delivery system with a primary goal of reducing avoidable hospitalizations by 25%.

Health Home clients are Medicaid-eligible adults who have two chronic health conditions, such as diabetes, obesity, hypertension or substance abuse, or one serious mental illness or HIV/AIDS. They are frequently high utilizers of costly emergency room services, using them for their primary care, and often

because a preventable medical or mental health problem has gone untreated. Health Home clients, who are often referred from a hospital, are matched with a Care Coordinator who coordinates services including medical care and social or housing needs, and creates a care plan. These plans are revised every six months, and a comprehensive assessment is conducted every year. Mel Fish, pictured above with Care Coordinator Lashay Newell, has been working with the Equinox Health Home for four years. "I found that it has been very helpful with finding my way to senior housing that meets my needs. I have accomplished getting a copy of my birth certificate and social security card with the help of Lashay."

"We have good relationships with Medicaid providers throughout the community. We can make seamless referrals, and are able to match clients with practices that will best suit them," said Bridget McCarthy, Health Homes Manager. "Care Coordinators will often

accompany a client to their first appointment at a new practice. Many clients experience significant anxiety. By having their Care Coordinator with them, they are much more likely to make it to the appointment and begin to establish a relationship with that primary care provider and practice. This is an essential step in helping clients get the services they need to live healthier and safer lives, and to reducing their use of the ER as primary care."

Clients with mental health and substance abuse disorders can be treated at Equinox. "Whenever possible, we try to keep services in-house to make it easier on the client," noted Ms. McCarthy.

Equinox is joining HIXNY (Health Information Exchange NY), which is a secure, digital exchange of patient data that is fostering significant collaboration among the region's entire health care community.

That means that Equinox will get alerts when clients access other services, for example. And, if an ER doctor or hospital navigator sees that a patient is part of Equinox's Health Home, Equinox would receive an alert to follow-up with the patient.

"We will be able to communicate with hospitals and other providers directly through HIXNY," said Ms. McCarthy. This will help ensure the efficient and timely delivery of services, and strengthen collaboration on behalf of the clients.

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CEO's Message

As you may have heard, Equinox has moved from 95 Central Avenue. After careful consideration of our clients' needs and the agency's long-term financial health, the Board of Directors and leadership decided to sell the aging building. Most services offered at 95 Central have moved to our new Albany location at 102 Hackett Boulevard, which offers efficient space and better parking. The Youth Outreach Center will remain at 95 Central. (Please see the facing pages for more information.)

Another significant change has been the recent closing of the Equinox House for Youth (EHY). Fewer and fewer homeless youth have been choosing to enter short-term emergency shelter, preferring to move from one friend's home to the next. After several years of sharply declining use, the program was unsustainable due to requirements such as 24/7 staffing regardless of the number of clients. There is, however, almost always a full house at our Transitional Living Program that offers longer term supervised living and support services to help homeless youth (ages 16 to 21) achieve self-sufficiency and permanent housing. Equinox also continues to serve hundreds of youth every year through the Youth Outreach Center and its street outreach program. These changes, along with Equinox's progress toward managed care reflect our commitment to ensuring that the agency's resources are being best used to support the programs and client needs.

The momentum continues as we gear up for another busy fall. October brings Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Every year Equinox provides support, safety and services to more than 2,000 individuals affected by domestic violence. Visit our website and Facebook page for information.

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


